Lesson Text: Hebrews 11 Lesson Theme: By Faith

**Introduction:** The book of Hebrews is one of the most profound, provocative, and providential books in all the New Testament Canon. It is a constitution on the Christology of Christ and His redemptive sacrifice for mankind. It reveals Christ fulfilling all three divinely ordained offices of the Old Testament: prophet, king, and priest. Hebrews plunges the depths of Christianity by exposing many of the false systems of belief, hardships, and failures that believers experienced at the time of its writing in approximately (AD 65). It can be seen as a back to the basics book. A book in which the writer wanted to communicate that **ONLY** Christ, not sacred traditions, or new ideas, was to be the center of our faith. This book should be viewed in the context of those whom it was written to, men and women in the 1st Century who were struggling with their faith in a life-or-death manner that we have never experienced. Over and over in this book it notes that these believers were facing persecution because of their faith. As a result, many were falling back into the rituals and rites of Judaism to avoid persecution. And even though this book wasn't written to us, we can look to it when life seems complicated, when we are uncertain, and when we feel our faith wavering. In all, Hebrews helps us to realign our faith to the truth of God's Word and his unwavering promises. We will see in this study that faith is the hinge upon which our convictions as believers swings.

**The Big Idea:** Hebrews makes clear that Jesus Christ exceeds <u>ALL</u> other people, pursuits, passions, and or hopes to which we offer allegiance. Therefore, without understanding this critical point, the rest of this theological treasure will not make sense. Neither will we be able to enjoy its redemptive provisions and promises.

Transition Statement: At the heart of Hebrews 11, we discover that faith is believing that God exists, that Christ was the personification (incarnation) of God in the flesh, that he is a rewarder of those who faithfully seek Him, and that we can have confidence in Him because His promises are always true.

A Theology of Faith: Faith is the divinely inspired human <u>response</u> to God's historical revelation through Jesus Christ. Its where our faith (truth) intersects with God's person and plan.

- > Truth is the basis for trust.
- > Trust is essential for developing a personal relationship with Christ.
- > Truth leads us to respond faithfully, consistently, and reverently to God in humility and obedience.

**Key Thought:** The men mentioned in this portion of scripture all faced challenges that tried their faith: "Gideon... Barak... Samson... Jephthah... David... Samuel... the prophets...yet they persevered. Some were tortured, scourged, imprisoned. All the consequence of faith. But in verse 39, we see that God honors (praises) the faithful--they received a good report.


**Textual Observation:** In verse 40, the word "better" contrasts the Gospel vs the Law. The Gospel is better because it provided a better sacrifice, and a better hope. New Testament believers have not just a shadow but the substance. We do not need the sacrifices of animals...Jesus was the Lamb slain...we need not a high priest to mediate for us, Jesus is the Great High Priest...We do not need a prophet, Jesus has spoken warnings and blessings. We do not need an earthly king; Jesus is seated in heaven as King of kings.

- 4. The Outcome of our Faith-(Peace with God) Rom. 5:1 "..we have peace with God by faith.
