Take Aways Concerning Translations

A Bible translation or version is a scholarly attempt to render the stories and thoughts of people from the ancient cultures who spoke ancient languages into a modern language that is spoken by people who live in very different contemporary cultures.

Formal – equivalent translations emphasize the similarity in the linguistics forms such as vocabulary and grammatical structures. Between the source and the target.

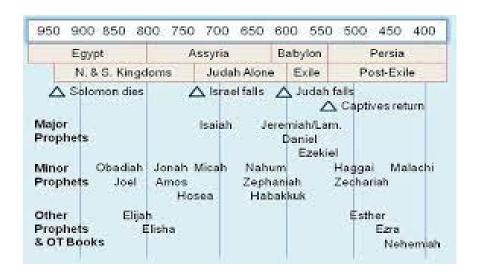
Functional -equivalence translations, on the other hand, stress the similarity in linguistic function (meaning) between the two languages.

BETWEEN THE TESTAMENTS—

<u>Comparison</u> between the Testaments- We are able to identify the messages and the materials of each testament when we make a healthy comparison of the two. While gleaning a better understanding of the meanings conveyed in the Texts.

<u>Completing</u> (Fulfillment) Between the Testaments- The fulfillment of the promise and the prophesy are very important in elevating our abilities to understand the carrying over we experience from the Old Testament to the New Testament.

<u>Commonality</u> between the Testaments- There are parallels that are evident in the Old Testament and the New Testament. Making these parallels allows for us to make a direct transfer of these principles into our daily lives.

<u>Conformity</u> to the Testaments- The principles of the Bible should lead to our performance or proper behavior toward the God of the Bible. Paul spoke of this in Romans Concerning Circumcision. Circumcision of the heart instead of just the circumcision of the flesh in Genesis.
