Distribution- Distribution of the New Testament what was the layout and the format of the New Testament which will assist us in fluently learning the principles of scripture. Matthew 26:13

New Testament: The second major division of the Christian Bible with 27 separate works or books. The majority is attributed to 8 different writers. At the core of the New Testament is the Gospels which there are four in total and three are recognized as synoptic.

The letters in the New Testament deal with the interpretation of God's act of salvation through Jesus Christ. Matters of discipline, proper Christian behavior and church polity also are included.

"Each text was written to serve some specific pastoral needs and answer a range of important questions arising out of the life of the church. Old Testament concerning Jesus Christ are fulfilled in the New Testament. However, many other prophecies will not be realized until the Lord returns. The New Testament completes God's written revelation of Himself to humanity (John 1:14; 2 Corinthians 8:9; Hebrews 1:1-2).
In the New Testament, we see the culmination [conclusion] of the eternal plan of salvation unfold on a barren hilltop outside the city walls of Jerusalem on one Friday afternoon. The Christian church calls this day and celebrates it annually (Matthew 27:35).
The New Testament is about the mission of Jesus Christ and His fulfillment of God's plan for human from sin and death (Luke 4:18-21).

The first century Christian church preached a powerful message about Jesus, making Him the center of their and witness (see Acts 2:14-36).
The New Testament is a collection of sacred writings that are distinctly Christian. There are twenty-seven separate books in the New Testament canon.
The New Testament has been accepted by the Christian church for more than 1600 years as its official canon of Holy Scripture. The New Testament is that part of the Bible that was written exclusively by and for the Christian church.
The New Testament developed very quickly after the founding of the Christian church. It had been completely written within a span of 50-70 years of the ascension of Jesus Christ, whereas the Old Testament took several hundred years to develop. It was not until around AD 367 that the New Testament was officially accepted, in its present form, as the authoritative canon of Christian Scriptures.

From the parent religion, they inherited the Jewish Scriptures the Old Testament; which were foundational to the forging of the new group; identifying not nearly the same way that they were for the synagogue."

"Gentile Christians were connected to texts only on account of their connection with Jesus. Jewish Christians were wholly reoriented to their scriptures by the same. Both were called together into one new community by preaching of the apostolic witnesses to what God was doing in Jesus."

"Access to the traditions about and sayings of Jesus – together with the direction and guidance of reliable apostolic voices – was therefore of critical primary

First , because it contains the account of the birth, life, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ (Matthew 1:18-25; Luke 1:26-38).
Second, it teaches us that Jesus Christ is the of all the Old Testament prophecies concerning the Messiah (Matthew 2:1, 6, 18, 23; 3:1, 16).
