At this point in Peter's letter, the focus changes from theological to practical. Up to this point, Peter had explained that the believers were to live holy lives, revealing their status as God's chosen people. In this section, Peter offered practical advice for holy living in an unholy and often hostile world. As believers who have received God's mercy (2:10), we ought to live worthy of our calling. This begins the next major section of 1 Peter (2:11–3:12). It centers on the Christians' relationships to non-Christians. Because we are the community of God (2:4-10), we must live like it.
